

SCLARC VENDOR ADVISORY COMMITTEE JANUARY 8, 2020 MEETING MINUTES--DRAFT

I. Call to order

Meeting was called to order at 10:01am by Illona Hendrick

II. Welcome & Introductions

Illona Hendrick, Chair, welcomed everyone to the meeting.

III. Minutes

The minutes of the November 13, 2019 meeting were approved without corrections. Minutes were moved by Karina seconded by Pedro.

IV. 2020 Vendor Information

Ms. Kelli introduced the training topic calendar for 2020 for the VAC. The VAC does not meet in August 2020 or December 2020. The topics were selected from the survey sent out to vendors late last year. The topics were the most popular and most chosen by those that completed the survey.

Kelli reviewed the contact list for vendor help and for the clinical department. The VAC will bring a suggestion box going forward for vendors to add any comments or suggestions.

v. Vendor Fair Q&A

Illona spoke about the vendor fair. There are some rules that the LA Convention Center has stated should be followed. Illona reviewed a list of rules. The Convention Center does not want you to take in any food to sell or give away. We want to make sure that vendors understand that there is to be no food or drinks allowed. The VAC may be charged a penalty if people take food or drinks.

All service coordinators are asked to attend to the vendor fair. There are over 200 service coordinators that will attend as well as management. Vendors were also reminded that no individual give-away should be valued at more than \$25. SCLARC staff is prohibited from accepting any type of gift that is valued over that amount.

VI. Dr. Kim Bowie---- Updates Q&A

Dr. Bowie distributed some documents. She stated it is important to make sure that SCLARC has a valid e-mail address to communicate information with you. If you have more than one e-mail address you would like to provide, that is ok. In addition, Dr. Bowie wants to make sure that you provide SCLARC with a physical number where they can reach a facility. Sometimes, they have a cell phone number on file for multiple facilities and that delays getting information to a specific facility.

The new temporary rates will be entered into the e-billing system in January so that they show up in February when you do the billing. There may be some clean-up that has to take place. The temp increase is going to be 8.2% for most vendor codes that are part of the increase. Supported employment will have a 7.6% increase. This temporary increase is due to Senate Bill 81. The state is waiting for the Federal approval for CMS matching funds. All regional centers that use your vendor number will have the new temporary rate in their system as well.

Some service codes will not see an increase. Facilities licensed by Department of Health will not see an increase. Specialists codes that are on the negotiated rate but normally have rates set by CMS will not see an increase. These codes include 114, 115, 116, 117 that will not see an increase.

The rates take effect January 1, 2020. It may take some time for Community Services to get the report showing the new rates. There may be an e-mailed contract addendum with the new temporary rate. ARM facilities will not get notification letter.

Minimum wage went up to \$13 in California on January 1 for employers with 26 or more employees in the same tax ID. Contact SCLARC if your reimbursement rate for 1:1 service is less than State minimum wage. Vendors can ask for a health and safety waiver exemption. Waivers for local minimum wage increases follows the same process.

VII. Executive Director Report

Mr. Henderson welcomed everyone and wished everyone a happy new year. It is good to see so many vendors at the first meeting of the year. It is important to be involved. On January 10, the final comments on the rate study are supposed to come out. The 8.2% temporary rate increase is already in the law to the end December 2021. It is hoped a permanent solution is found and approved by the legislation. As vendors, it is necessary to voice concerns and advocate for the rates. Although 8.2% is a start, it is not sufficient.

<u>Desiree:</u> the new name is the Advocates Advisory Committee. It meets every fourth Monday for 10am to 12pm.

<u>Vendor</u>: would like to know in advance which trainings have CEU's in advance. The VAC will inquire and let vendors know.
