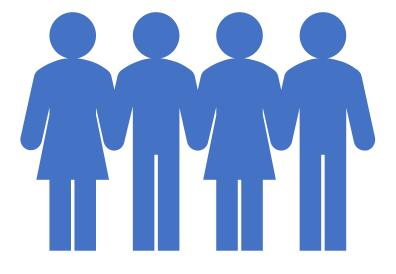

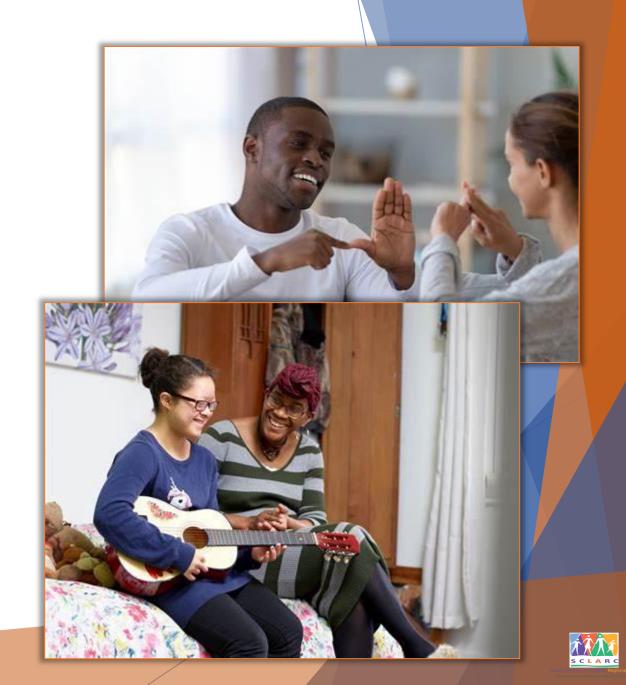


SCLARC's Goal

What is Vendorization?

Vendorization is the process where service providers meet California State regulations (Title 17 & Title 22) to become approved vendors.

How it Works:

1. Review SCLARC Website for Community Needs and Apply
Submit all supporting documents to TBDvendors@sclarc.org detailing all qualifications and experience.

2. SCLARC Team Review:

Ensure compliance with state requirements.

3. Get Approved:

Receive Vendor ID & Service Code.

4. Start Serving:

Begin providing services and billing through the Regional Center.

Steps to Becoming a Vendor

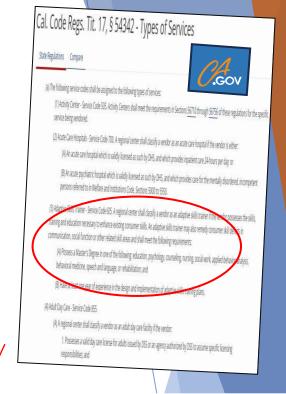
Step 1: Choose the Type of Service You Want to Provide

 Before applying, identify the service you want to offer by reviewing the California Code of Regulations, Title 17, Section 54342 (CCR 17), which outlines the approved service types and the qualifications required for each one. https://govt.westlaw.com/calregs/Search/Index

> Example:

If you're developing an **Adaptive Skills Training Program** you would select: **Service Code 605**

• Each service code is linked to a specific program type and eligibility guidelines for providers.



Adaptive Skills Training - Service Code 605

A regional center classifies a vendor as an Adaptive Skills Training program if the vendor has the skills to enhance or remedy skills in areas like communication, social function, safety, hygiene, feeding, technology, behavior, and more.

Adaptive Skills Training Professional:

Master's degree in a related field (education, psychology, counseling, etc.) and 1+ year of experience in designing and implementing training plans. Provides supervision to Specialists.

Adaptive Skills Training Specialist:

Bachelor's degree in a related field and 1+ year of experience supporting individuals with intellectual/developmental disabilities. Works under Professional supervision.

✓ Tip: Make sure the service you select matches your experience, program model, and qualifications.



Steps to Becoming a Vendor cont.

Step 2:

 To apply as a vendor, you must meet the requirements outlined in California Code of Regulations, Title 17, Section 54310 (CCR 17), including the necessary background, credentials, and readiness to operate as a provider.

> What You'll Need:

- A business address within the SCLARC's service area
- Proof of qualifications, credentials & work experience
- Scope of Work of services
- Relevant licenses, accreditations, & certifications
- Business license
- Insurance
- Required forms (e.g., DS1890, DS1891, W-9)

Tip: Gather all your documents early to avoid delays and ensure a smooth application process.

Gather Your Required Documents

✓ Know What's Required per CCR Title 17, §54310

To complete your vendor application, you'll need to provide:

Basic Information:

Name, contact details, and service address Type of service you're offering Facility capacity (if applicable)

- Supporting Documents: (including but not limited to):
 Business license, certifications, or permits
 Relevant academic degrees
 Program Design/ Scope of Work (if required for your service)
 Additional documentation requested by SCLARC
- ✓ Once all required documents are gathered including any additional SCLARC requirements you may submit your proposal for vendorization.
- ➤ These requirements are outlined in California Code of Regulations, Title 17, Section 54310.







Understanding: Request for Proposal Process

What is a Request for Proposal (RFP)?

A Request for Proposal (RFP) is a call from SCLARC for needed services or supports for individuals with developmental disabilities. (Welfare & Institutions Code §4648.11)

Why it Matters:

RFPs outline specific programs and services that SCLARC currently needs, along with the qualifications that applicants must meet.

Key Details to Know

- Program & Service Needs: Specifies the services SCLARC is seeking.
- Qualifications: Lists required applicant qualifications.
- Follow the RFP Exactly: Adhere to the RFP to meet requirements.
- Denial Risk: Missing criteria may result in denial, regardless of experience.
- ✓ Tip: To avoid a vendorization denial, review the full RFP request and ensure your proposal meets every requirement.



Step 3: How to Access the Request for Proposal (RFP)

✓ Steps to Access the RFP:

- 1. Visit www.sclarc.org
- 2. Click on the Service Providers tab
- 3. Select Request for Proposals from the dropdown
- 4. Follow all RFP instructions carefully for a complete submission

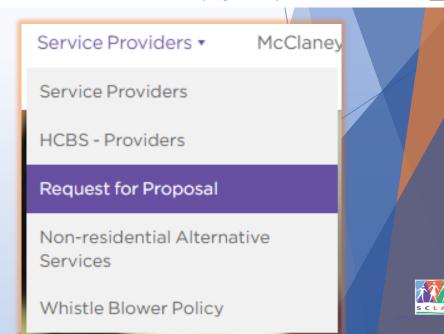
Important Reminder:

- Review all qualifications and instructions carefully.
- Ensure your submission meets every requirement before applying.
- Applications <u>NOT</u> following the RFP exactly will be denied.

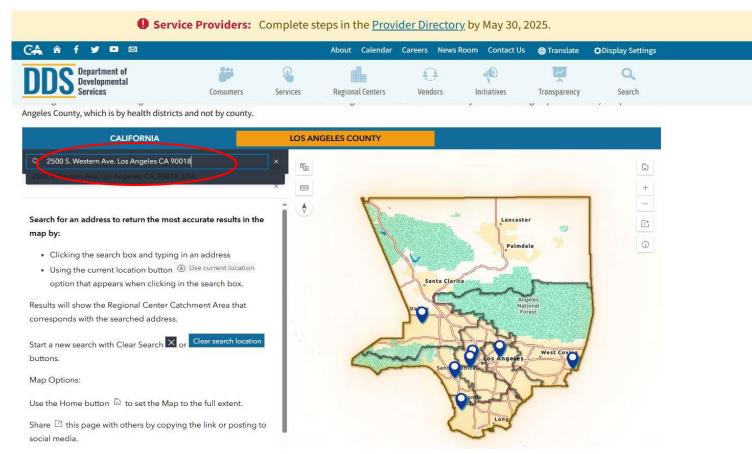
Regional Center Lookup



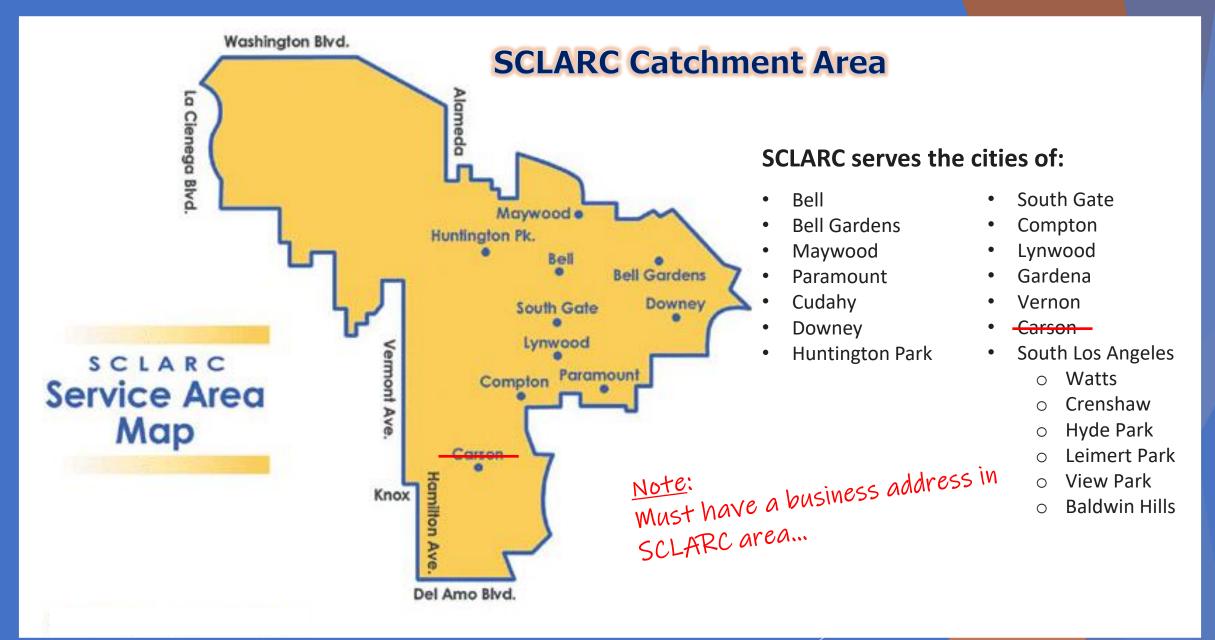
Enter the <u>full address</u> to get the most accurate results.

- Visit www.dds.ca.gov
- 2. Click on "Regional Centers"
- 3. Click on "Regional Center Lookup"
- 4. Select "Los Angeles County"
- Enter the complete physical address (street number, street name, and zip code)

Use DDS website to verify SCLARC's catchment area.









Equity and Diversity in the RFP Process

The Welfare & Institutions Code (WIC) 4648.11 is a section of California law that requires regional centers to include equity and diversity considerations in all Requests for Proposals (RFPs) for consumer services and supports.

- ✓ What You Need to Know: Equity & Diversity Are Required
- All RFPs must include a section on equity and diversity.
- Ensures services are accessible to culturally and linguistically diverse communities

Your Proposal Must Include:

- ✓ Plan for Serving Diverse Populations
- ✓ Examples of Your Commitment
- ✓ Supporting Strategies & Practices

Why This Matters:

- ✓ Ensures equal access to services
- ✓ Addresses disparities in service delivery
- ✓ Promotes inclusive, community-based supports





Important Points to Remember

- RFPs Are Posted Based on SCLARC's Current Needs
- ✓ Check SCLARC.org regularly for open RFPs and resource requests
- ✓ Announcements may also be sent via email or posted on the website
- Engage with SCLARC early
- ✓ Understand current needs and service gaps
- ✓ Before purchasing property, hiring staff, or submitting a Letter
 of Interest

Important Reminder Vendorization does NOT guarantee referrals





Key Agencies & Regulations To Know

DDS - Department of Developmental Services

- Oversees services for 360,000+ Californians with developmental disabilities
- Ensures supports respect individual's culture, language, and life choices
- Operates through 21 regional centers across California

CCL - Community Care Licensing

- Licenses and monitors adult & childcare facilities
- Regulates caregiver qualifications, staffing ratios, and safety standards

CCR - California Code of Regulations

- State laws that regional centers must follow
- Key sections: Title 17 and Title 22

WIC - Welfare & Institutions Code

- Governs services like Medi-Cal, mental health, foster care, and more
- Sets rules for fair and equitable service delivery
